After all, she is not the sweet girl who has a smile for everyone, who radiates pride when her body usually non-cooperative allows her to take some unassisted steps, and who delights in the examination of the pages of any book that can find. when using the word r, she is not a playful girl, a person to love. She is just a "retard". for these reasons and many others the keyword gives me enough trouble for both. I know that many of you are rolling your eyes, thinking that this is a common expression and that I should lighten. I'm sure that's what mom said she was "so late to get lost" on the street for a party in a room full of four-olds this weekend thinks. is such a thought that allows the continuous marginalization of individuals with disabilities. is such a thought that leads to playgrounds and schools under construction that are not accessible to all. which leads to the further marginalization of children like my lord. until we change this thought, and our language, too many will continue to think about people with disabilities not as people who are precious members of society, but as something less. something "retarded" that can be easily pushed aside and mistreated. It's not something I can take lightly. It is not something that each of us should accept. if you appreciate living in a diverse and inclusive society where everyone is valued, please think before talking — and talk at any time you hear the word r.all better for this. Once it was the medical term used to describe a person who has development problems. And yes, he's in the dictionary. Of course, they are also the words, dungarees, galosches and percularator. But what do I know? Perhaps you still like to use them to describe jeans, rain boots and coffee makers. Life would be much more beautiful if people come back to as old times. You didn't have to worry about meeting a fantastic person like my daughter or her friends of her. Teenagers and happy young adults and proud to go to a store and pay something yourself. Or hold a job of shoe shelves. You don't have the time to smile and get to know someone again, or give another human one or two minutes more if you meet them while helping you pack your shopping or call your purchase. You are busy. You have important things to do. I understand that you amount less than what I think, but I'm very sorry for you. The point of Of this he has to do with the accuracy in the use of our language. I don't need anything to encode a message using a word like methony, or heteronimo, or tautonimo, unless it is certain that my listeners (or readers) know about it. Or that, or I am ready to add the definition to their advantage, in which case I could use the definition from the beginning. However, learning the correct use of words, as far as arcane, can be useful, and if you like the words themselves, even fun. What is your idiot? In his book «The Half-Life of Facts: Why Everything We Know Has An Expiration Date», Samuel Arbesman3 discusses the language changes that take place over time and the two fields that differently see this phenomenon. He explains the prescriptive grammar like the one that focuses on the way in which words should be used, and descriptive grammar such as the one that cares more than the way they are actually used. Arbesman states that every individual develops his own series of rules on how to use words, and that all of us, you and all others, have our personal idiol.
