The playwright took Dr. Seuss' iconic tetrameter to rewrite the famous crossed lovers in a unique game. All the memorable moments of the three-hour Shakespearean saga are present: The prologue, Juliet's betrotallo in Paris, Romeo crashing Montague's party (here Monotone), the nurse discovering Romeo's identity, the tower scene (balcony), Romeo and Juliet The battle scene of Tybalt and Mercutio, the banishment of Romeo, Juliet faking her death, and Romeo finds her in her grave. There is, however, a final twist which is very Dr. Seussånobody dies. A Cat In The Hat car instantly changes everyone into friends and everyone lives happily ever after. To wrap it up, Bloedel also added two alternate endings. The first alternate ending takes the entire game in a page and a half and the second ending takes it even faster and backwards. The Seussification of Romeo and Juliet is set on an empty stage and has few notes of lighting or costume. It is, however, a prop-heavy show: rolling beds, a Cat-in-the-Hat-spired car, crackers, balloon swords, a bullhorn, rubber, and much more. If you have the budget, the designers and the technical crew to create the sets and costumes, this script offers a great challenge: to determine how Dr. Seuss can reimagine Verona and the two infamous families of Verona. The language of this game requires as much attention, interpretation and understanding as Shakespeare does. It is important to note that although dialogue is easier for young actors to understand, it still requires understanding and practice of meters, rhythm, rhyme and nuanced delivery.
